Summer Worship Time

Beginning May 26 (Memorial Day Weekend) our Sunday Worship times change to one service on Sundays at 9:30. We will continue with one service on Sunday through the summer. The last day for this time will be August 18. *The Saturday 5:00 p.m. service will remain through the summer.*

Copeland Park Service

On August 25 there will not be a service in the sanctuary. Instead, we will meet at 10:45 at Copeland Park for the annual River Service.

Riverside Park Service

On June 9, 10:00, we will have worship at Riverside Park as a part of the annual Synod Assembly. There will not be a service in our sanctuary that day.

Fall Worship Times

On September 1 (Labor Day Weekend) the services will resume to the three service model. Saturday 5:00 p.m., Sunday 8:30 and 10:45 a.m..

LIGHTING THE PASCHAL CANDLE

During the Vigil of Easter worship service, we experience again the heart of God's baptismal promise and the center of our faith: we are claimed and cleansed, renewed in the death and resurrection of Christ. We bless and light a NEW Paschal candle to remind us of this promise. This new candle, usually placed near the baptismal font, will be used throughout the year and will be lit every Sunday during the season of Easter, and throughout the year for baptisms and funerals.

The "old" Paschal candle will be added to our collection of "retired" Paschal candles (as shown below) that we display on the Vigil of Easter and Easter Sunday to help remind us of those who have come before us.

We hope these fidgets will help promote better focus for those who need it and hope everyone will work as a community to keep these sensory bin items in our church building.


Vacation Bible School
